Frances Stackhouse Acton (1794-1881)

1. Introduction

Frances Stackhouse Acton (nee Knight) was born on the 7th July 1794 at Elton Hall in Herefordshire. Her father Thomas Andrew Knight was a well known horticulturist and botanist and the brother of classicist Richard Payne Knight of Downton Castle - the Thomas Knight family moved to Downton Castle in 1808. Frances Knight married 43 year old Thomas Henry Pendarves Stackhouse the son of John Stackhouse (1742-1819) - another botanist with interests in algae and mycology - at Downton Church on the 28th October 1812. The couple moved to Acton Scott Hall on the death of Stackhouse's mother when they took the name of Stackhouse Acton. They had one daughter, Frances who was born in 1812 but died at the age of 17 in 1830. Thomas Henry died in 1835 leaving Frances to pursue her many activities until her death in 1881.



'Fanny' Knight was encouraged by her botanist father to take up her own interests. Among her attributes were a proficiency in botanical drawing, an interest in archaeological excavations - a Roman villa was discovered in the grounds of Acton Scott Hall - and an interest in historical buildings – both in the painting of and the repair of the building. She took a particular interest in the maintenance of Stokesay Castle where she persuaded the owner to allow her to supervise the restoration of the castle. She compiled a collection of her father's papers and wrote an account of her early life in 1873 at the request of her sisters (Bedford County Records Office and also authored *The Castle and Mansions of Shropshire*.

Her younger sister Charlotte (ca.1801-1842) was also a practising horticulturalist winning in 1817 a silver medal at the Horticultural Society for her *Waterloo Cherry*. She married Sir William Edward Rouse Boughton in 1824 and took residence at Downton Castle. The Rouse Boughtons were active members of the Ludlow Natural History Society.

2. Frances Acton Scott as a Fossil Hunter

To the above list of 'Fanny's' interest must be added geology and fossils. She donated specimens not only to the Ludlow Natural Historical Society but also to the Royal Geological Society of Cornwall, this latter owing to her links with the Stackhouse family property Acton Castle, located at Stackhouse Cove in Cornwall. Frances was an early member of the Ludlow society becoming a subscriber in 1836 and remained a member until at least 1871. She donated some 30 specimens to the Society. A selection taken from the 1928 La Touche catalogue is given below.

This is a fairly wide-spread collection area. Of interest is the listing of fossils found at Acton Scott by other members of the Society including Humphry Salwey, Alfred Marston and Robert Lightbody – suggesting that they were regular visitors?
